

# **Head of the Department of Social Sciences** and Communication

My name is **Tatiana Magaleas**, and I am a teacher of Romanian and World History. I currently serve as the Head of the Department of Social Sciences and Communication. I have been teaching for almost twenty years, nine of which I've spent in the wonderful family of the Heritage International School.



What I value most about my job is the chance to awaken my students' curiosity about our shared past. One of my greatest joys is hearing them say, after just a few lessons, "History is interesting! We thought it was only about dates and maps!" As they grow older, my eighth- and ninth-grade students often tell me that studying history has helped them become more thoughtful and well-rounded individuals. They learn to understand historical processes, explain the impact of events, compare social and economic developments, and evaluate foreign policy. For me, that is a true achievement.


Like anyone else, I am both drawn to and slightly anxious about new challenges. Whenever I begin a new project, I have my share of emotions and doubts, but I always aim for the outcome to be useful, accessible, and meaningful for both students and teachers.

In 2017, I launched **History.md**, an educational platform that became a project very close to my heart. It offers students video lessons, interactive games, and profiles of historical figures designed according to the exam model for ninth grade. I feel proud every time I read the encouraging comments from students, teachers, and history enthusiasts beneath each video.

I also created a collection of worksheets and educational games for fifth graders, which have been warmly received and are now used in almost every school across the country.

In 2024, one of my most significant professional milestones was the publication of the **History textbook for the tenth grade**, developed together with my colleague, Daniela Vacarciuc. Seeing it used in schools throughout the Republic of Moldova has been deeply rewarding.





This year, in 2025, I took on a new role as a **National Mentor**, guiding and supporting young teachers and colleagues who seek to grow in their profession.

At the moment, I am working on a new project dedicated to the history of Chişinău—its people, places, and stories. My hope is to inspire students, teachers, and the wider community to discover that Chişinău is truly a European capital, and that the Republic of Moldova rightfully belongs on the European path. I believe that each of us can contribute to knowing our national history and preserving our traditions.

Outside of work, I love collecting encyclopedias—the latest addition to my collection is one devoted to the history of the Moldovan carpet. I also enjoy active travel; as the old saying goes, "Better to see once than to hear a hundred times."

Every Christmas, my family and I make it a tradition to prepare a box filled with food, clothes, toys, or money for someone in need. We ask the local doctor to deliver it without revealing who it's from—just to say it's "from Santa Claus."

My name is Jeffrey Hearn, and I teach Mathematics at Heritage International School. This is my third year here and my forty-second year as a full-time teacher — which also makes me the oldest teacher in the school!






#### **3B Writes Their First Picture-Based Essay**






#### **Climate Action Project 2025**



To all our teachers: Happy Teacher's Day! Your dedication shapes futures, and your impact is felt far beyond the classroom walls. Thank you for everything you do.







# 10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators SAFETY ON SOCIAL MEDIA

Currently, children are growing up in an immediate and throwaway culture when it comes to content that's consumed online. So much material is now deliberately created to be shorter in nature – and may often contain hidden elements such as advertising, or extreme political and cultural views. With complex algorithms built to keep people on their phones and engaging with social media content, it's becoming increasingly difficult to reduce time spent on these platforms.

#### REDUCE DOOMSCROLLING

## FIND POSITIVE

Despite all the concerns, there's plenty of wholesame content on social media. It's worth spending time with children to help them find something suitable and enjoyable. Perhaps you'll even discover a joint interest, and you can enjoy the content alongside the child. As part of this, you should also point out why certain things shouldn't be given attention, explaining why it isn't suitable and why it's been created in the first place.

#### 4 REDUCE SCREENTIME

Young people can sometimes be unaware at the exact amount of time they spend looking at social media. Smart phones don't just have the capacity to monitor screentime; they also record how much time is spent on each app. Consider setting targets to reduce this and support children to meet these goals, graduall reducing the amount of time spent on different apps.

#### 5 FILL THE VOID




Monitoring and reducing screentime can create a lot of free time to fill, and young people can even face withdrawai symptoms when made to step away from their phones. To mitigate this, consider what offline activities you could introduce the child to, and what they would enjoy. This can ensure that young users will permanently cut down on their screentime, rather than temporarily doing so while they know it's being monitored.



#### 6 REDUCE NOTIFICATIONS

One way in which social media platforms keep people coming back is through notifications. The algorithms behind these apps track people's daily habits, including the times of the day where they're most likely to engage with the platform. This data is then used to deliver specifically timed notifications to draw them back in. To avoid young users being exposed to this tactic, simply uurn off notifications for the app in their phone's settings.

#### 7 LIVE IN THE REAL WORLD

Overexposure to social media can distort someone's perception of the real world – from body norms to social conventions. This filtered environment can make it hard for young people to distinguish reality from online content, which is now becoming even more difficult with the rise of Ai. To mitigate this concern, take time to teach young people how to discern truth from fiction, both on and off social media.

#### **8 DIGITAL DETOX**

Encouraging young people to take a "digital dotox," from even just a couple of the apps that they use, can result in an overall reduction of screentime and less exposure to potentially harmful content. Alternatively, rather than avoiding the appentirely, encourage children to take a "digital detoy from content creators and influences, and instead, keep in touch with friends and family – which is generally a far healthier use of these platfarms.

## 9 MODEL GOOD BEHAVIOUR

Consider the habits that you're demonstrating to your children. How much time do you spend on your phone? How much do you'doomscroll? Comparing your own us age with the child's could put things into perspective for them — or if it turns out that you're disc overusing social media, it can turn screentime reduction into a joint mission, which you and the child can work on tradelier.

## 10 BE CLEAR ON THE "WHY"

Research shows that young people can become addicted to social media. There are many schools that are moving towards being 'phone free' due to the negative impacts of using social media and phones continuously. It's important to explain to young people why managing screentime is important. Set out the benefits and ensure they have all the relevant information, so it's not just seen as a punishment.

Our team is dedicated to the holistic health of our community and is prepared to provide support as needed.




## **School Information**

#### Measures for preventing the spread of COVID-19 infection

According to the Letter from the General Directorate for Education, Youth, and Sports no. 01/16-6/2701 dated 11.09.25, "in order to ensure compliance with the measures for preventing the spread of COVID-19 infection, access to educational institutions is restricted for individuals from outside the institution. In exceptional situations, access is permitted only with shoe covers and a face mask." Therefore, parents' access to the school will be allowed only in cases of strict necessity, provided that masks and shoe covers are worn inside the school premises.

#### Submission of the medical certificate from the family doctor

The medical certificate issued by the family doctor must be submitted to the school if the child has shown symptoms of seasonal respiratory infections or other infectious diseases, including cases identified within the school. In case of absence for reasons other than illness, the parent must submit a signed statement on their own responsibility (in free form) confirming that the child is clinically healthy.
